






## Notice for Request for Qualifications (RFQ) Western Shore Watershed Management Planning Mobile County Alabama







## STRENGTHENING THE COASTAL ECONOMY

Nutrient pollution, super storms, flooding, economic impacts from a changing climate - our nation's estuaries and the communities surrounding them are facing new and uncharted territory. As Co-Chairs of the Congressional Estuary Caucus, we invite you to join us in expressing support for the National Estuary Program (NEP), a time-tested, non-regulatory, investment program that reflects coastal and economic priorities associated with the nation's 28 Estuaries of National Significance.

In the 114th Congress, the Estuary Caucus led the passage of Public Law 114–162 to reauthorize historic levels of overall funding for the NEP, create the competitive grants program, and cap program administrative costs at EPA at five percent. In 2016, Congress unanimously responded to the Caucus by directing more funding to each of the 28 NEPs and funding the competitive grants program to address urgent challenges in our estuaries.





#### Dear Representative Wilcox.

You have requested a general bill which would strengthen penalties for littering statewide and a local bill which would strengthen penalties for littering in Mobile County.

The first draft of the general bill has already been provided to you. A draft of a local bill for Mobile County is being sent to you with this letter. However, this bill, if challenged, may be held to be unconstitutional as provided for below.

Section 104 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, provides that the legislature shall not pass a local law fixing the punishment of crime. Additionally, Section 105 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, provides that the Legislature may not enact a local law in a case provided for by the general law. The Supreme Court of Alabama has construed this provision to mean that the enactment of a general law on a given subject generally precludes the enactment of a local law on the same subject. There are some exceptions to this rule, including the following:

- 1. Where the general law authorizes a local law on the same subject.2
- 2. Where the local law is authorized by a local constitutional amendment.3
- Where the legislation responds to local needs that have not been substantially provided for and effectuated by a general law.<sup>4</sup>

Relating to Mobile County, to amend Sections 2 and 3 of Act 81-451 of the 1981 Regular Session (Acts 1981, p. 792) to expand definitions; to provide for additional penalties for littering; and to provide for final disposition of fines paid for violations of the act.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Sections 2 and 3 of Act 81-451 of the 1981 Regular Session (Acts 1981, p. 792) are amended to read



- After information has been compiled and processed, the CRC intends to complete the workplan at the May 8 meeting.


